Inclusive & Respectful Language in France: What to Know

First Impressions: Greetings & Polite Openers

- Master inclusive French greetings that signal respect, professionalism, and cultural awareness from the first second.
- Prioritise “Bonjour, Madame/Monsieur” with eye contact and neutral, friendly tone.
- Use “Bonjour” upon entering the room and before any further formal presentations. Start interactions with “Bonjour, je m’appelle...” and offer a handshake only if welcomed.





Pronouns & Formal “vous”: Choosing the Right Level of Formality

- Adapt pronoun choice and formality to French professional norms to show respect, inclusion, and cultural awareness.
- Default to “vous” in professional settings until explicitly invited to use “tu”.
- Use names or neutral terms when pronoun or gender preferences are unclear.
- Politely offer preferences such as “Nous pouvons nous tutoyer” or “Vous pouvez me tutoyer” after a few encounters.

Why Inclusive Language Matters (Workplace & Culture)

Understanding inclusive language in France strengthens trust, supports collaboration, and prevents cultural missteps for international professionals.

- Inclusive language reduces workplace friction and supports smoother multicultural collaboration in France.
- Respectful phrasing signals professionalism, credibility, and reliability with French clients and partners.
- Culturally aware language choices help avoid unintended offence in socially sensitive French contexts.

Meetings: Inclusive Turn-Taking, Clarity, and Tone

- **Set Inclusive Ground Rules**

Open with norms on speaking time, interruptions, language speed, and questions in simple French and English.

- **Facilitate Fair Turn-Taking**

Invite quieter participants explicitly, rotate speaking order, and summarise key points to confirm shared understanding.

- **Use Clear, Neutral Language**

Prefer “vous”, gender-neutral job titles, precise action verbs, and avoid idioms that confuse non-native speakers.

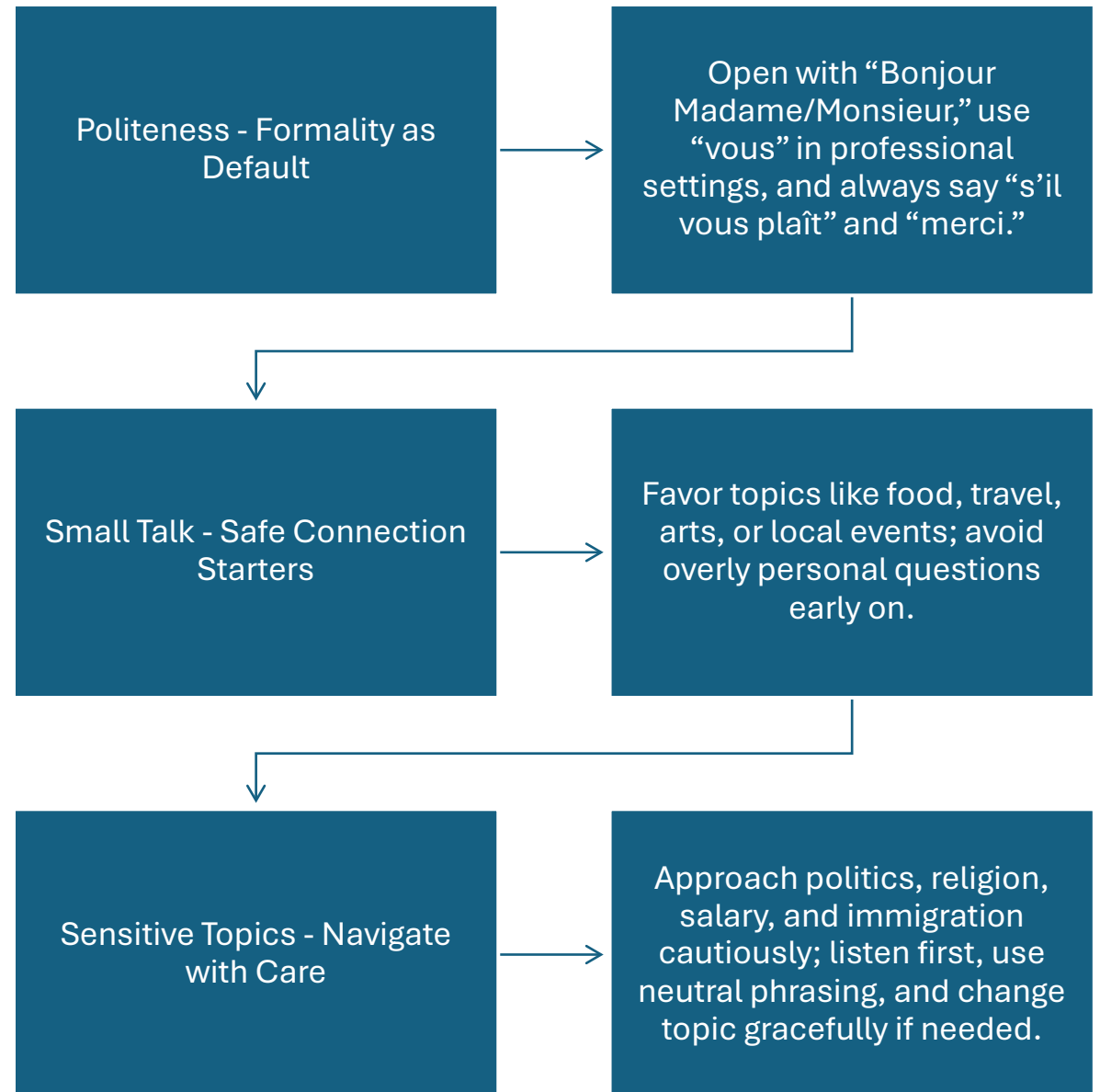
- **Close With Inclusive Follow-Up**

Recap decisions, responsibilities, and deadlines in clear language, then confirm understanding via short written summaries.



Use culturally aware language to build trust in France, balancing formality, warmth, and discretion.

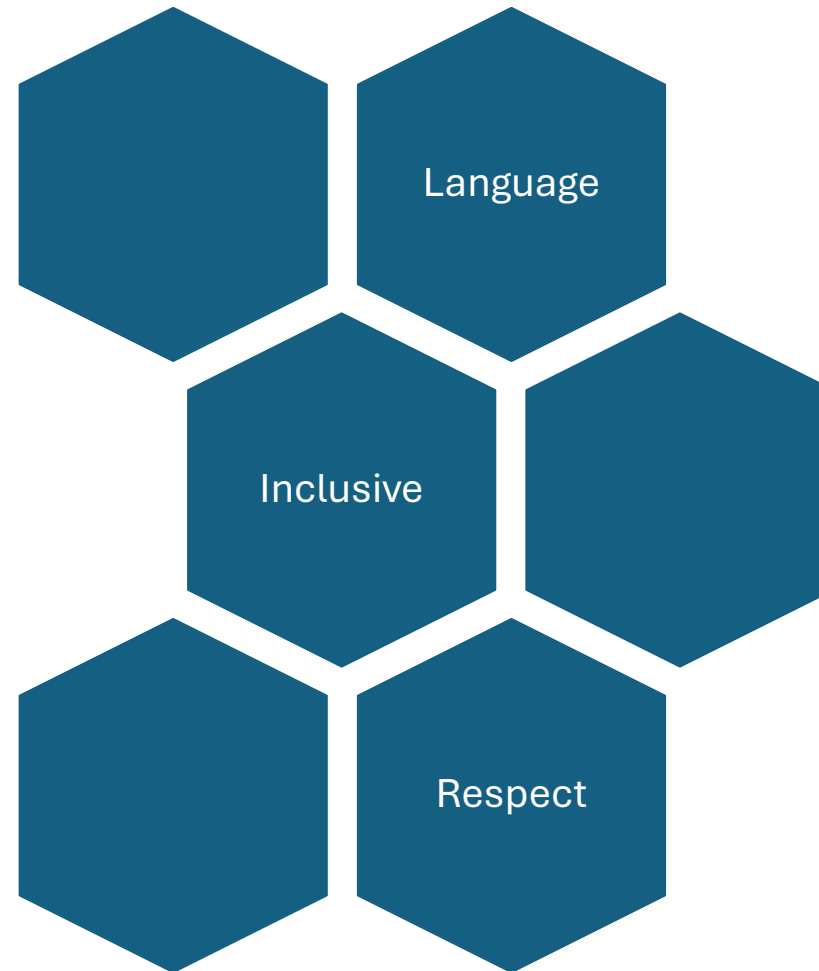
